

Bible Reading for Week of June 15, 2025

Monday, June 16 – Exodus 1:1-22

In verses 15-22, the Hebrew midwives are said to have been “*dealt well*” with by God. In what way were the actions of the midwives an expression of faith in God? How does the fear of God drive out the fear of man? Pray that the Lord would grant you a holy boldness to live for Him this week.

Tuesday, June 17 – Exodus 2:1-10

How do Moses’s parents demonstrate faith in God in this passage (see also Heb. 11:23)? Can you think of ways in which Christians are (or might be) called to exercise faith in the face of persecution? Ask the Lord to give you peace and comfort so that you can withstand whatever He may bring your way this week.

Wednesday, June 18 – Exodus 2:11-25

In his reflections on the life of Moses, how does the author of Hebrews see an exhibition of faith from our passage (see Heb. 11:24)? How does Moses’s identification with the people of God change his life? In what ways has your life changed since God “*called you out of darkness into His marvelous light*” (1 Pet. 2:9)? Take time today to give praise to the Lord for His grace in saving you.

Thursday, June 19 – Hebrews 11:23-29

How does the author of Hebrews describe Moses and parents (see vs. 23 and 27)? How does the fear of God play a role in the life of the believer? How does one cultivate the fear of God (see Ps. 130:4)? Pray that the Spirit of Christ would cultivate the same fear of the Lord which rested upon Christ Himself (Is. 11:2).

Friday, June 20 – Hebrews 11:23-29

In verses 24-26, the author of Hebrews says that “*Moses considered the reproach of Christ greater wealth than the treasures of Egypt.*” In what ways might this have served to encourage the original audience that the book of Hebrews was written to? In what ways might this encourage and challenge us even today?

Saturday, June 21 – Hebrews 11:23-29

At the end of these verses, the author considers the scenes of the destroyer and the Exodus. How do these two stories of redemptive history serve to demonstrate judgement for God’s enemies and salvation for God’s people? As you think about gathering with God’s people for worship tomorrow, how do these stories serve to bring praise from your life and lips?
